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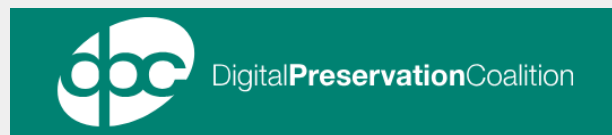

DPC Joins EMBARK European Preservation Initiative

The Digital Preservation Coalition (DPC) has joined EMBARK, the newly approved European Media and Born-Digital Art Conservation and Knowledge Network. EMBARK is a four-year COST Action uniting expert across Europe to preserve media art and born-digital artworks. As part of this pan-European initiative, DPC will contribute its digital preservation expertise to help safeguard these culturally significant digital formats for future generations. This collaboration strengthens cross-institutional efforts to address challenges in maintaining access and conserving complex digital heritage.

Infra Finder Update: New Entries, New Categories, and a Rolling Intake Process

Infra Finder had a strong year at IOI, expanding to 134 entries and introducing a rolling intake process that allows new submissions year-round. Since January 2025, 32 new infrastructures have been added and 70 existing entries updated. Three new solution categories—data collection or management tools, geospatial data tools or platforms, and integrated library systems or services platforms—reflect growing community interest. Participants can explore recent changes by sorting entries by “Recently Updated.” A new survey also invites users to share how they use Infra Finder and its data.

Conçue pour répondre aux exigences croissantes de réutilisabilité, de transparence et de conformité aux principes FAIR, elle s'adresse aux chefs de projet, producteurs de données, data managers et archivistes. Structurée en six phases, la check-list facilite l'intégration des métadonnées dans le plan de gestion de données, la vérification avant dépôt et l'archivage pérenne, tout en restant adaptable aux contextes institutionnels et disciplinaires.

DOAJ Updates Guide to Applying: Shared Copyright, S2O Rules & Clarified Requirements

The Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ) published its latest quarterly update to the *Guide to Applying*, refining key editorial and policy points. The update now explicitly allows shared copyright between authors and publishers, though DOAJ notes it can be complex and doesn't recommend it. It also introduces a requirement for journals using the Subscribe to Open (S2O) model, ensuring immediate and uninterrupted open access if the yearly subscription target is met. Additionally, DOAJ clarifies the meanings of terms like “must” (requirement) versus “should” (recommendation) for application criteria.

Building a National ISNI System: Interfaces & Continuous Metadata Processes

This project report documents the Finnish initiative (January 2024 – October 2025) to develop a dedicated ISNI submission interface and establish continuous processes for updating contributor identifiers in the international ISNI database. Coordinated by the National Library of Finland and involving five Finnish copyright management organisations, the work produced a tailored API for submitting data, automated cyclical identifier processing, and a long-term vision for nationwide ISNI adoption. The project improved metadata quality, promoted digitalisation in the creative sector, and laid the foundation for broader use of persistent identifiers across organisations and domains.

South Korea's National Library Makes 30 Million Bibliographic Records Public via OpenAPI

The National Library of Korea has announced that it is opening access to its extensive national bibliographic data — previously limited to specialists — for the general public and private sector. Through the government-supported *National Bibliography Linked Open Data* initiative, the library will offer an OpenAPI via the public data portal, enabling easier use and integration of bibliographic information. The released dataset includes records on books, serials, online resources, authors, subject headings, and library information, with support for linking both domestic and international metadata.

British Library Launches New Main and Archives Catalogues as Part of Post-Cyber-Attack Recovery

The British Library has introduced a new main catalogue alongside an interim Archives and Manuscripts Catalogue, marking a significant milestone in its ongoing recovery from the October 2023 cyber-attack that disrupted many digital services. The new main catalogue allows users to search, find, and request the majority of printed materials in the collection in one place, while the Archives and Manuscripts Catalogue offers searchable access to historical and special items. Searching is free, but a valid Reader Pass is required to request materials. Support materials, guides and in-person help are available to assist users with the new system.

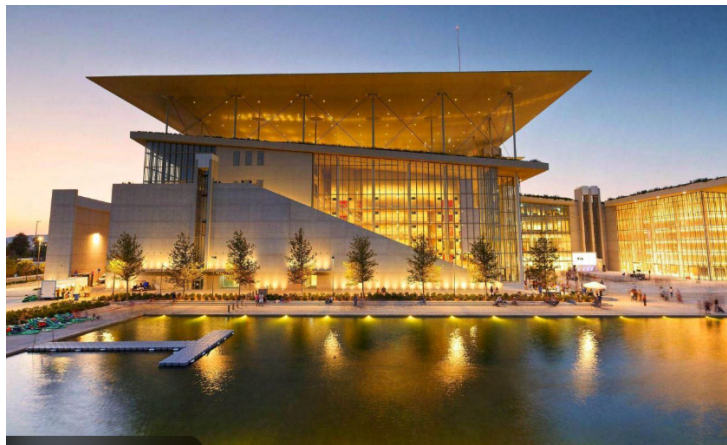

Designing Belonging: Libraries as Inclusive and Open Public Spaces

The international conference “*Designing Belonging: Libraries as Inclusive and Open Public Spaces*” was held on 1–2 December 2025 at the National Library of Greece, organised by the Committee for the Support of Libraries (CSL). Bringing together library leaders and professionals from across Europe, the event focused on how libraries can foster inclusion, accessibility and social cohesion. Presentations and discussions explored user-centred design, co-creation of services, universal accessibility and partnerships, highlighting libraries’ evolving role as open, welcoming public spaces that respond to the needs of diverse communities.

'Safeguarding Scholarly Communication', a report and a call to action by STM (the International Association of Scientific, Technical & Medical Publishers)

The research and publishing landscape has transformed dramatically over the past decade. Researchers work with research publishers to communicate more good research, now more openly than ever before. But the shadow cast by the activities variously described as 'paper mills' has served as a major call to action. What was once managed through trust and reactive intervention when needed now requires systematic and proactive approaches. This STM strategy comprises the deployment of dedicated research integrity teams, integrated screening across the publication workflow, the establishment of integrity expectations through structured frameworks, and the development of the STM Integrity Hub — a collaborative infrastructure enabling cross-publisher detection and information sharing.

Global Mapping of University-Affiliated Journals: Insights from 19,414 Titles Across 148 Countries

This study presents the first large-scale bibliometric mapping of university-affiliated journals, compiling a dataset of 19,414 active, peer-reviewed titles from 148 countries using Ulrichsweb and cross-referencing Scopus, Web of Science, DOAJ and OpenAlex. It finds major disparities in indexing coverage — nearly three-quarters of journals appear in OpenAlex, about half in DOAJ, but fewer than a quarter in Scopus or Web of Science. The landscape is dominated by journals from the U.S., Indonesia and Brazil, shows substantial linguistic diversity, and emphasizes social sciences and humanities, providing a baseline for studying bibliodiversity and equity in scholarly communication.

BIBFRAME and MARC Conversions v3.0: A Major Update for Music Data and Identifiers

The Library of Congress has released version 3.0 of its MARC-to-BIBFRAME and BIBFRAME-to-MARC conversion programs, together with BIBFRAME and BFLC ontology v3.0. This release incorporates properties and classes from the Performed Music Ontology, introducing significant changes that differ from earlier v2.x versions. Key updates include improved handling of medium of performance data, refined treatment of music identifiers, and wider use of standard identifier URIs. Additional corrections and enhancements are provided in BIBFRAME and BFLC ontology v2.6, including a new citation property.

AI Use in Scholarly Publishing: Bridging Policy and Practice

A recent guest post on The Scholarly Kitchen reflects on a COPE *Publication Integrity Week* panel about the gap between artificial intelligence (AI) policies and real-world use in scholarly publishing. Panelists observed that most researchers now use generative AI regularly, yet many policies lag behind practice and authors often hesitate to disclose AI use due to misunderstanding and stigma. They emphasize the need for clear guidance, regular policy updates, training, and open dialogue among authors, editors, publishers, and institutions. Collaboration and transparency are key to developing pragmatic, integrity-focused AI policies.

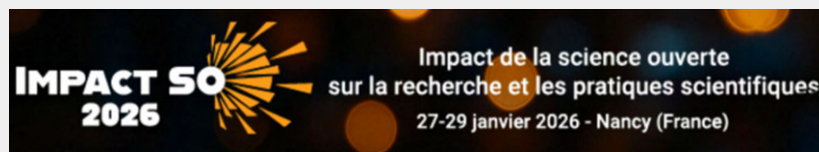
